The work of the Talent Pipeline Task Force was inspired by our community's existing assets in the areas of education and workforce. Members consist of a diverse mix of employers, workforce development leaders, chambers of commerce, and postsecondary education and social service providers.

The report contains specific recommendations for educational institutions, local employers, and local government that include strategies like expanding current successful programming, supporting educator professional development, and streamlining and coordinating efforts. Task Force members also worked to create career pathway documents for each targeted industry illustrating the necessary training and skills for individuals to move from entry level to high skill jobs.
